Dear Parents,

Our first week has been a busy one and the children have coped so well. Some tired, hot children and adults by Friday. We are particularly proud of our Reception class who are settling well into their new class and routines and the staff will let you know when they are ready to use the gate as the entrance. A warm welcome to all our new families in Reception and across school. We have also welcomed children into Year 2, Year 3 and Year 4 this week.

Start of the Year Mass

On Wednesday, Fr Paul came into school for our Start of Year Mass. It was a beautiful way to start the new year. Sr Phyllis and several of our wonderful governors joined us.

On Monday the 14th October at 9:15am we will have or Mass for the Feast of St Wilfrid. All are welcome to join us for this special celebration.

Earrings

Despite several reminders, there are still children in school wearing earrings. I know that we are often thought to be kill joys insisting on this rule so here is the advice we and other schools and coaching facilities follow:

The 2020 edition of <u>'Safe Practice: in Physical Education, School Sport and Physical Activity</u> <u>(PESSPA)</u>' is written by the Association for Physical Education (afPE) every four years, it is the essential reference and developmental tool, for everyone, offering up-to-date advice to help teachers, coaches and school governors protect their students and themselves from potential risks across both the curriculum and extra-curricular activities.

"Schools have a duty of care to ensure students are able to participate actively without unnecessarily endangering themselves or those working around them. The Association for Physical Education (afPE) strongly recommends the practice of removing all personal effects at the commencement of every lesson to establish a safe working environment. This applies to all ear and body piercings, including retainer and expander earrings."

Young children can't always take earrings out - a teacher shouldn't be taking earrings out either. The 2020 version goes onto say: "Staff are not required to remove or tape up earrings for students. Taping over ear and body piercings may offer a measure of protection in some physical activity situations, where individuals are required to work within their own personal space. However, the amount of tape used needs to be sufficient to prevent the piercing penetrating, for example, the bone behind the ear should an unintentional blow be received from someone or some item of equipment, such as a ball."

The removal of earrings by children is something we would wish to avoid as children often find it difficult and any loss of them would cause upset. Children use PE equipment at playtimes and lunchtimes which is why we prefer to have a blanket ban on earrings in school.

If your child has had their ears pierced recently then they may put plaster or tape over them until they are able to be taken out and left out all day. This is usually between 6 and 8 weeks.

Label, Label, Label!

We already have some lost property and because it is not labelled it is not easily returned. Anything your child may take off or put down MUST be labelled.

Assemblies

This week we have had two assemblies. On Tuesday we began the new school year with a Mission assembly where we revisited our Mission Statement and looked at our school values with the children. On Friday we welcomed Reception Class to their first assembly and we looked at our school rules and the five British Values. The children were enthusiastic at answering questions.

Tiny Library



A reminder that outside school, by the front door you will find our Tiny Library. It has three shelves and will be outside or just in the foyer. The top shelf will have books for grown ups, the middle shelf will have books for our older children and the bottom shelf is for our younger children or siblings not yet in school. **The books are free**. You may take them, read or share them and pass them on or return them in the same condition. We top up the books often so will also ask for donations of books we can put in our Tiny Library. Just drop off any books in good condition in a bag to the office or leave by the Tiny Library and we will sort them.

Parents' Evenings

In the last week of term there will be an opportunity to speak to your child's teacher at our Autumn Parents' Evening, details will follow. You will be able to look at your child's work before your appointment time as well as their classroom environment.

Uniform

The children all looked very smart coming into school this week. A few children were in white shirts without ties. Red ties can be purchased from the school office and are on the School Gateway. Ties with elastic are £3.75 and full ties are £4.

Online Safety

Each month we send out an Online Safety newsletter. This is produced for us by experts and we feel it is an invaluable resource for parents.

Please have a read of this week's one. Please ensure that your children are only accessing ageappropriate games, films and online content. Children do not have the emotional maturity to cope with material produced for an older audience.

Walking Home

Lots of our Year 5 and 6 children now have permission to walk home or to meet siblings or parents on campus. We monitor this carefully and the St Nicholas staff report any silly behaviour to us. Please remind your children that this is a privilege and that they need to act responsibly.

Nut Free School

Just a reminder that we like most schools are a nut free school. We have children with severe allergies to nuts in school and the start of the year is a good time to remind everyone. Our school kitchen is nut free and we ask that all healthy snacks brought into school as well as packed lunches do not contain nuts. Please do not give your children peanut butter or Nutella type spreads. Staff in school bring in nut free lunches too. Please check all snacks for nuts. Thank you.

Pick Up Arrangements to Safeguard all our Children

There is no parking at the front of school for pick up.

The front of school is for Pre-School pickup and can be used by blue badge holders if the designated spaces are full.

Thank you to those families who have bought tickets for the St Nicholas playground car park for the term or the year. These tickets can be purchased on School Gateway at 70p per day or £35 for the term.

St Nicholas insist that we park the cars in a certain way so please follow the instructions for parking given by our staff.

From Monday all passes will be checked. If you do not have a pass, you will be asked to park off campus and walk down. On Friday we had cars parked at the front of school which is not fair on those parents who pay to park on the St Nicholas playground or who park off site and walk down.

Parking on the yellow hashed area is dangerous, please do not park there. Traffic exits the other schools on the campus and crosses the hatched area making it unsafe to walk across.

Garden Centre Vouchers

Please ask for these if you are heading to the garden centre in Winnington. They are not always offered. They are really useful for us, we buy seeds, soil and plants for school.

Parking by the blue gates

There are three parking bays by the blue gates. Greenbank school have asked that our parents **do not use them** as they need that lane free for their taxis. They will put cones and a sign out. We all share the campus roads and need to make traffic flow as free as possible
